Haughton River Floodplain Upgrade Sustainability and Sustainable Sourcing Policy

The Infrastructure Group (TIG) is committed to delivering the Haughton River Floodplain Upgrade (HRFU) in a manner that enhances sustainability and provides positive long-term outcomes for the region. - Work practices
 - Maximising equitable training and employment opportunities for the local and Indigenous communities
 - Considering environmental, social and economic aspects during procurement for suppliers and subcontractors
- 5. Community respect and protection
 - Working with stakeholders to ensure the project delivers benefits for the local community
 - Engaging the local community early, proactively and respectfully to identify the mutually beneficial outcomes.
